PITTSBURGH, March 8, 2017 — Carnegie Science Center invites guests to blast off at the next no-kids night. **21 + Space** happens Friday, March 24, from 6 – 10 pm.

Guests will learn about space travel and distant galaxies in the Buhl Planetarium and have the chance to stage a “moon landing” photo in front of a green screen. Activities also include the chance to build and launch a straw rocket and to make a star clock to read the stars. During the evening guests can also take control of a LEGO Mars rover and see explosive chemistry demonstrations in the Works Theater show “It Came From Outer Space!”

As always, 21+ Night features cash bars, snacks available for purchase, and the chance to experience the exhibits with no kids! Live music will be provided by the Ray Lanich Band in the Science Center’s Robot Lounge. Participants get a discount on Omnimax movies and laser shows that evening.
